Steve Urszenyi's debut novel, "Perfect Shot" (\$25), was published in November 2023 and became an instant Indigo Books bestseller. It has been featured in the Globe and Mail and was a Canadian Living magazine selection. Apple Books said the story's protagonist, Alexandra Martel, is their "new favorite hero—Alex is relentless and dedicated to taking down the bad guys."

Urszenyi's writing has been compared to John le Carré, Stephen Hunter, Mark Greaney, and Jack Carr. BookTrib called Perfect Shot "a modern-day masterpiece of international intrigue that qualifies as a major debut in this superb international thriller." Publishers Weekly proclaimed, "Urszenyi is a writer to watch." Perfect Shot was a finalist for three literary awards:

Exemplary Service Medal and Bar in recognition of his distinguished service. When not writing, Steve loves traveling the globe and touring on his Harley-Davidson motorcycle with his wife, Lynne. They live in Toronto and have two grown children.

John Steckley taught at Humber College for 30 years, retiring in 2015. He has a B.A and an M.A in Anthropology and a Doctorate in Education from the University of Toronto. His research is primarily on the Indigenous people of Canada, especially the Wendat (Huron)/Wyandot. He has studied their language for 45 years. Of the 22 books he has written, seven of them relate to that language. In addition, he has written textbooks in Sociology, Physical Anthropology and Indigenous Studies. His latest book about the first black Canadian woman becoming a doctor.
